Statehouse Happenings

Committee hearings in January were on the light side to say the least. The winter break did not end until mid month.

The first hearing was Tuesday the 16th when the House Transportation Committee heard testimony on HB 299 and HB 365. Both bills would designate memorial highways in Ohio.

It was the second hearing for House Bill 299, but there were no witnesses and no written testimony was submitted. The bill is sponsored by Representative **Don Jones** (District 95) and would designate a portion of State Route 7 in Washington County as the "Specialist Five Frederick Wayne Taylor Memorial Highway."

House Bill 365 had its first hearing and Representative **Tim Barhorst** (District 85) provided his sponsor testimony. HB 365 would designate multiple

memorial highways. It would designate a portion of U.S. Route 68 in Champaign County be named "Army Corporal Charles E. Hiltibran Memorial Highway." A portion of U.S. Route 68 in Logan County would be named "Army PFC Herbert S. Bechtel Memorial Highway." Also in Logan County a portion of State Route (SR) 235 would be named "Patrolman Frank J. Hossler Memorial Highway." Hossler was a U.S. Marine Corps veteran and served with the Ohio State Highway Patrol.



Following questions from the committee, Vice Chair, **Dave DoBos** (District 10) moved to report favorably House Bill 365 out of committee and recommend its passage. The committee voted unanimously to approved his motion. The senate held a couple of hearings the

following week. The Education

Committee met on Tuesday, the 23rd for a hearing on a house bill and the next day the Veterans and Public Safety Committee met to hear testimony on two senate concurrent resolutions and a senate bill.

Tuesday, Representatives Jessica E. Miranda (District 28) and Tracy M. Richardson (District 86), Sponsors of House Bill 250 provided testimony. HB 250 would rename the "Military Enlistment Seal" to the "Military Seal" and would establishes new pathways for a high school student to earn the seal. The bill passed in the house chamber with a 95 to 0 vote in

November of last year.

Wednesday, in the Veterans and Public Safety Committee Senator **Tim Schaffer** (District 20) gave sponsor testimony on SCR 8 and SCR 9.

SCR 8 would urge the President of the United States, the United States Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and

BILLS & RESOLUTIONS INTRODUCED IN JANUARY

SR 262:

Introduced by Senators **Tim Schaffer** (District 20) and **Bill Reineke** (District 26) on January 9th. It was adopted the same day.

The resolution resolves: That we, the members of the Senate of the 135th General Assembly of Ohio, in adopting this Resolution, mourn the loss and salute the memory of a truly unique individual, Senior Airman Brian "Kody" Johnson; and be it further RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Senate transmit a duly authenticated copy of this Resolution to the family of Senior Airman Brian "Kody" Johnson.

<u>HB 378:</u>

Introduced by Representatives **Brian Lorenz** (District 60) and **Nick Santucci** (District 64) on January 16th. It was referred to the House Ways and Means Committee.

The bill would amend sections 323.151, 323.152, 323.153, 4503.064, 4503.065, and 4503.066 of the Revised Code to authorize a full homestead exemption for surviving spouses of members of the uniformed services killed in the line of duty.

WHAT OTHER STATES ARE DOING

There are plenty of bills that will help veterans, military, or families of veteran or service member in just about, if not all the fifty states. Some of them are similar to bills we have in our general assembly. Some of them are unique to the states the are in and some are the 'Hey, why didn't I think of that' variety. There may also be a few bill that will make you shake your head in bewilderment.

We will take a look at some of the Vet/Military bill in other states. They are bills introduced within the past year or so. They may still be in committees, they may have passed out of committee, or they may have been signed into law. You can look at the progress of each by going to the websites of each of the state's legislature.

Maybe some of them will spark some interest and begin to grow in Ohio.



In the West Virginia General Assembly

Senate Bill 385: Establishing program to pay monthly allotment to all veterans who have been honorably discharged, who are 65 years of age or older, who served on active duty during a period of war, and who are not currently receiving a Federal Veterans Administration check for disability or retirement.

House Bill 4903: Makes vehicles exempt from payment of registration fees, by lowering the percentage of a service-connected disability required for exemption from 100 percent to 50 percent or greater; and, by adding recipients of the Distinguished Service Cross, Navy Cross, or Air Force Cross, to the list of persons who may receive such exemption.

House Bill 4720: Provides a waiver of tuition and fees at state institutions of higher education and community and technical colleges for military veterans, their spouses, and dependents, when that veteran has a service-related disability of 50 percent or greater.

House Bill 4731: Provides that first \$5000 per year earned on Military Duty, Active, National Guard, or Reserves be exempt from the WV State Income Tax.



In the Rhode Island General Assembly

Senate Bill No. 21: Allows a modification up to fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) of taxable pension and/or annuity income includible in federal adjusted gross income for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2024.

Senate Bill No. 148: Provides issuance of an occupational license, certificate and permit for military service members licensed in other states and relocated to Rhode Island.

House Bill No. 5128: Allows cold war, veteran administration connected disability, and RI National Guard with less than 90 days service admission into veterans' home.

House Bill No. 5465: Provides that the fifth day in April in each year be designated as "Rhode Island Gold Star Spouses Day" with appropriate exercises in public places and with flags flown at half-staff over the state house.

House Bill No. 5933: Requires employers in the state with more than 50 employees to display a poster containing basic information on veterans' benefits and services which would be created and distributed by the DLT in consultation with the office of veterans services.

House Bill No. 5999: Provides free admission to any state owned recreational facility for Gold Star families with exceptions for docking slips.

House Bill No. 6017: Allows members of retirement systems who also served in the national guard or reserves to purchase retirement services credits.



In the Iowa General Assembly

Senate File 33: An act relating to the tuition and fees community colleges and state universities charge to former crew members of any United States navy vessel named for the state of Iowa.

Senate File 106: An act relating to lifetime trout fishing licenses for disabled veterans.

Senate File 465: AN act providing for a veterans' benefits and services poster for employers to display in the workplace and provides penalties.

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OUR OPINION

Yes! Restore Our Readiness

Who would name their resolution ROAR? Sounds a little undignified for a piece of legislation. But we think, as did the sponsors, that it is a very fitting name for HCR 9.

House Concurrent Resolution 9 is the work of Representatives **Jennifer Gross** (District 45) and **Bernard Willis** (District 74). The short title of the resolution is Adopt Restoration of America's Readiness (ROAR) Resolution. But it is the long title that tells the reader exactly what it is about.

Long title: To urge the United States Congress to restore the Department of Defense's superior warfighting principles of recruiting, assigning, training, promoting, and retaining personnel solely based on merit and ensuring such personnel maintain and display a warrior ethos, and to name this resolution the "Restoration of America's Readiness (ROAR) Resolution."

The Resolution's eight whereases clearly lays out the reasons for the three resolves. The whereases clearly point out that the United States has proven that she is the world's greatest warfighting nation for nearly as long as she has been a country. That it is chiefly due to the ability of her personnel to be kind and compassionate during times of peace while maintaining the ability to become willing and able to engage an enemy when the battles of war require it.

They further address the concern that during the past several years the D.O.D. and it's branches have engaged in some practices that are chipping away at the warfighting principles of our Armed Forces and could be putting our county's military dominance at risk.

The resolution lists five examples of the practices that are of concern.

- Overemphasizing and relying on diversity and inclusion in all its forms, including gender, gender identity, race, and sexual preference, as a primary determinant in how military forces should be comprised without providing credible and verifiable evidence that such a prescribed composition results in higher job performance, unit effectiveness, and mission accomplishment, as opposed to a model in which a meritocracy-based force composition is used
- 2) Making nonsensical "unconscious bias" training mandatory for all military and civilian personnel
- 3) Instituting mandatory "emergency use only" COVID-19 vaccines with little regard to individual medical concerns in light of the Anthrax vaccine mandate problems of the late 1990s and denying almost all requests for exemptions based on religious grounds, which is particularly troubling given the recent decision by the United States Department of Defense to rescind the COVID-19 vaccine mandate
- 4) Requiring mandatory training at the United States Air Force Academy to incorporate "person-centered" and gender neutral language when describing individuals and to request cadets to consider using the term "parent" or "caregiver" rather than "mother" or "father" as not to offend those that may come from a different parenting background
- 5) Requiring mandatory indoctrination of every cadet at the United States Military Academy in Critical Race Theory, a theory focused on dividing the American population along racial lines, which ignores the progress accomplished within the United States since our Civil War of the 1860s, so as to manufacture voting blocks for radical politicians, and creates distrust of the leadership of the United States Army

Further whereases point out that the success of our military has always relied on the concept of recruiting, assigning, retaining, and advancing in rank based on aptitude and performance regardless of their "race, gender, sexual preference, or other personcentric identifiers." They claim that type of practice is one of the causes of low recruiting numbers and may cause those currently serving to refrain from reenlisting.

The resolution concludes with "therefore be it Resolved, That we, the members of the 135th General Assembly, urge the United States Congress to use its authorization and appropriation authorities to prohibit the use of such "woke" social engineering and experimentation practices, which are eroding military effectiveness, and to mandate a return to a meritbased system for military force development and composition resolved."

the United States Congress to take prompt action to reduce the processing time for veterans' disability benefit claims.

SCR 9 would urge the U.S. Congress to support the provision of prompt and comprehensive mental

health treatment to military personnel and veterans who are suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder and other service-related stress disorders.

Both resolutions would also require the Clerk of the Senate to transmit copies of each resolutions to the President of the United States, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, the Speaker and Clerk of the U.S. House of

of the Ohio Congressional delegation, and the news media of Ohio.

Senate Bill 154 had its second hearing and heard from one proponent and received written testimony from another proponent. SB 154, sponsored by Senator **Kristina D. Roegner** (District 27) would amend many sections within the Oho Revised Code to include Space Force in the definition of the armed forces, armed services, and uniformed services of the United States. It is a bill *Ohio Legislative Report* supported in the October issue.
